Early Intervention and Prevention Service

The Early Intervention and Prevention Service offer a range of support and services designed to help families in the Wakefield District at the right time. This is provided in the form of groups and interventions through the Family Hubs and Youth Hubs across the district.

The support available can be accessed for a range of reasons, for example:

- School attendance problems
- Behavioural problems
- Employment and debt problems
- Health problems
- Wellbeing problems
- Have a child that needs help

If you are having issues with any of the above or any other similar problems, getting support as soon as possible could be really important.

Family Hubs provide a venue and a linked network of local community venues, specialist services and partner organisations so that you can access early help, meet other local families, take part in activities, and join helpful groups.

Youth Hubs deliver support for young people aged 11-24 and work closely with other teams and partners to meet the needs of young people from across the Wakefield district.

How does getting help early work?

There are different ways to access support from the Early Intervention and Prevention Service, these include:

Team Around the School (TAS)

If you have a concern about your child in relation to behaviour, school attendance, or emotional health and wellbeing, contact your school who, with your permission, can request support and a TAS meeting can take place.

At the meeting, the school TAS Lead, Family and Youth Hub Practitioner, School Nurse, Future in Mind Practitioner, and Education Improvement Teacher (Secondary Schools) or Inclusion & SEND Advisory Teacher (Primary Schools), will discuss the concerns and make a recommendation of the best package of support to offer, by which service.

This support plan would then be fed back to you, and the service who have been identified as responsible for leading on support would get in touch to agree the plan, discuss timescales, and start date.

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Targeted Early Help Service

The Targeted Early Help Service support children, young people and families where there is a need for an Early Help Assessment. An allocated Early Help Practitioner will complete the assessment which will identify what support is needed and will then work with the family and partner agencies to develop a coordinated package of support. The support plan will be reviewed on a regular basis to ensure the plan is effective.

The Targeted Early Help Service can provide coordinated support to families experiencing:

- School attendance problems
- Have a child who need help
- Domestic abuse
- Employment and debt problems
- Health problems
- Crime and anti-social behaviour problems

The Targeted Early Help Service will work closely with the Early Intervention and Prevention Service, utilising the groups and interventions if appropriate for the family.

How does getting help early work?

There are different ways to access support from the Targeted Early Help Service, whether you are a parent or carer, or a professional seeking support for a family you are working with, these include:

• 'Team Around' models

The Targeted Early Help Service will receive a referral from the Team around the School or Team around the Early Years meetings if it is considered an Early Help Assessment is needed.

Integrated Front Door

The Targeted Early Help Service will also receive a referral from the Integrated Front Door if considered appropriate following the screening of a safeguarding referral.

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Team Around the Early Years (TAEY)

If you have a concern about your child in relation to your child's development, speech-language and communication, physical health, emotional wellbeing, and behaviour, contact your childcare provider or Health Visitor who, with your, permission, can request support and be taken to the next TAEY Meeting.

At the meeting, the childcare providers (nurseries, pre-schools, childminders), Early Years Coordinator, Area Early Years Special Educational Need Coordinator (SENCo), and Health Visitor will discuss the concerns and make a recommendation on the best package of support to offer, by which service.

This support plan would then be fed back to you, and the service who has been identified as responsible for leading on support would get in touch to agree on the plan, discuss timescales, and start date.

A referral from a professional
